Author: The American poet and novelist, author of 'The Bell Jar' and the poetry collections 'Ariel' and 'The Colossus and other Poems'.



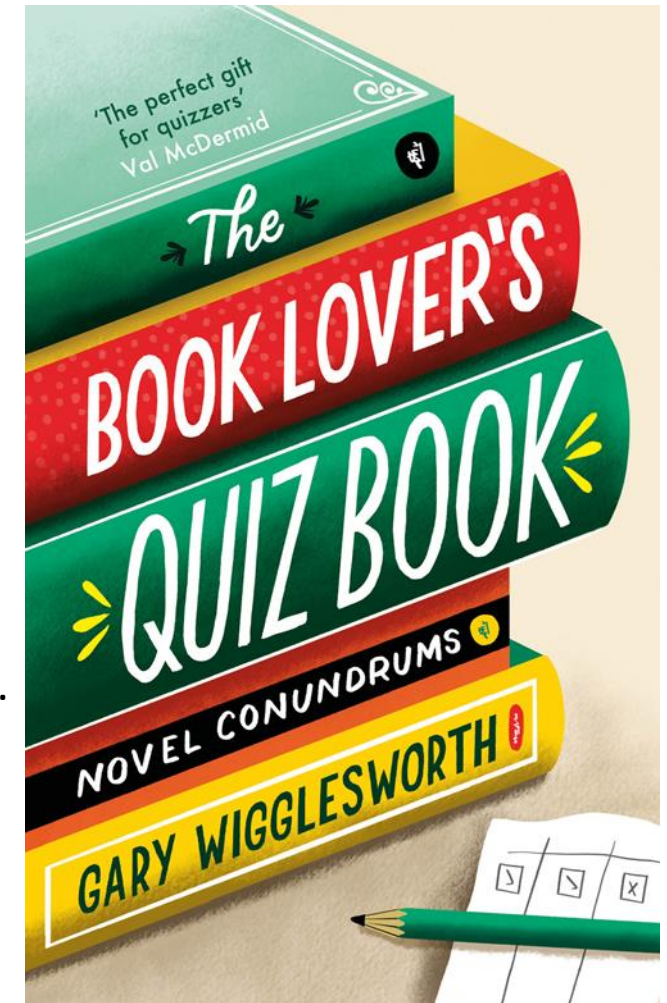
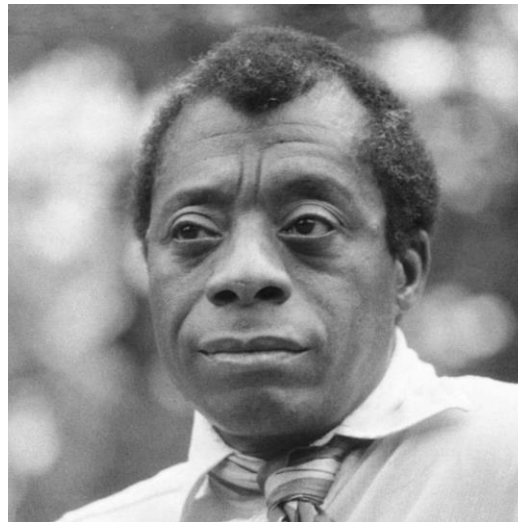
3. Character: The young English solicitor summoned to Transalvania in Bram Stoker's horror classic Dracula.

Author: The American author of 'Giovanni's Room' and 'Go Tell it on the Mountain'.



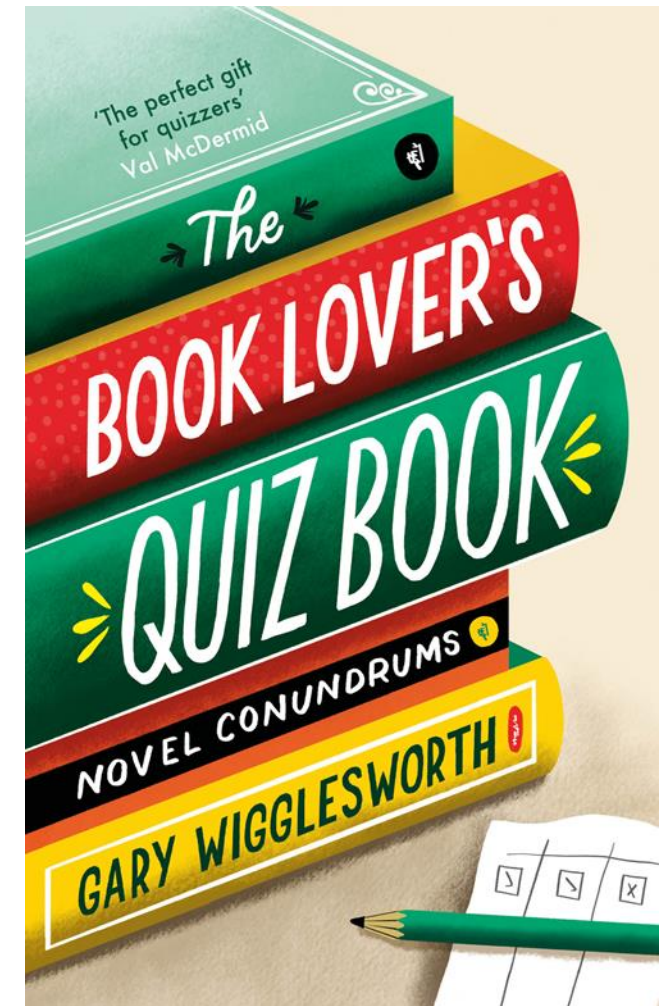
5. Character: The name of the professor created by Dan Brown who appears in 'The Da Vinci Code', 'Angels and Demons' and more.
